Mr. Chen's passion for Mathematics sparked his interest to employ a project by corresponding with NASA on the topic to find the duration of light exposure on any celestial body in space to decrease the cost for satellites and determine atmospheric composition of planets. DAUAA JAX Announces the Chapter's 1st annual "CAPTAIN CHUCK STUART" Scholarship

The Captain Chuck Stuart DAUAA JACKSONVILLE Chapter Scholarship recipient receives an academic scholarship awarded annually for demonstrated academic and leadership achievement as

well as significant community involvement. The scholarship will be initially setup as a \$500 scholarship that will be applied directly to the recipient's continued pursuit of academic excellence. DAUAA JAX is honored to have the support and leadership of CAPT Stuart in standing up the JAX chapter that has been extremely successful in impacting DOD civilians, military and the local community. Recipients must be a high school senior enrolled in an accredited university, college, community college, or trade school for the fall semester of the year of application. Recipients can be dominated by parent, grandparent, or legal guardian of applicant, must be a current or Associate Member of the DAUAA JACKSONVILLE Chapter in good standing. Read following bio of Captain Stuart.



Captain Charles M. "Chuck" Stuart, from Virginia Beach, Virginia, graduated from the United States

Naval Academy in 1991 and was designated a Naval Aviator in December 1993.

His two Lieutenant tours consisted of flying the CH/MH-53E "Super Stallion" helicopter with Helicopter Combat Support Squadron Four (HC-4) in Sigonella, Italy, and flying search and rescue in the HH-1N "Huey" helicopter at Naval Air Station Meridian, Mississippi. During his time with the "Black Stallions" of HC-4, Commander Stuart flew missions throughout the Mediterranean Sea and Persian Gulf, supporting seven carrier battle group and six amphibious readiness group deployments.

Captain Stuart was selected as an Aeronautical Engineering Duty Officer in 2001 and transferred to Naval Air Systems Command at NAS Patuxent River, Maryland. He served four years as the Test Manager for the V-22 "Osprey" Program (PMA-275), responsible for all developmental and operational testing of the Marine Corps MV-22 and Air Force CV-22 and leading to the program's successful return to flight in 2002 and operational evaluation in 2005.



DAUAA JAX Announces the Chapter's 1st annual "CAPTAIN CHUCK STUART" Scholarship

In 2005, Captain Stuart reported to the Navy and Marine Corps Unmanned Air Systems (UAS) Program Office (PMA-263). There he served as the Deputy Integrated Product Team (IPT) Lead for the Broad Area Maritime Surveillance program, Deputy IPT Lead for UAS Common Systems and as the IPT Lead for Submarine UAS Integration.

During his tour with PMA-263, Captain Stuart was temporarily assigned to Guantanamo Bay, Cuba, where he supported annual detainee reviews under the Office for the Administrative Review of the Detention of Enemy Combatants.

From 2008 to 2011, Captain Stuart served as the 15th Executive Officer and Commanding Officer of Fleet Readiness Center, Western Pacific, in Atsugi, Japan, providing depot aircraft support to 1st Marine Air Wing, Carrier Air Wing Five, and all Navy and Marine Corps ships and squadrons deploying outside the continental U.S.

Following his initial command tour, Captain Stuart was assigned as Chief of Staff to Commander Fleet Readiness Centers, before reporting aboard Fleet Readiness Center Southeast, as their Executive Officer in 2013. In July 2015, Captain Stuart took command of Fleet Readiness Center Southeast as their 40th Commanding Officer. While assigned to Fleet Readiness Center Southeast, Captain Stuart encouraged and supported the initial standup of the **Jacksonville Chapter of the Defense Acquisition University Alumni Association.**

Captain Stuart holds a Master of Science Degree in Aeronautical Engineering from the University of Maryland and a Master of Business Administration Degree from Mississippi State University. As a student of the Defense Acquisition University, Captain Stuart has earned "Level III" qualifications in Program Management, Test and Evaluation, Systems Engineering, and Production, Quality and Manufacturing. He has been awarded the Meritorious Service Medal, Joint Commendation Medal, Navy Commendation Medal, Joint Achievement Medal, and Navy Achievement Medal, as well as other personal, campaign and unit awards.



The Captain Chuck Stuart, 1500, USN DAUAA Jacksonville Chapter Scholarship Program

The **Captain Chuck Stuart DAUAA JACKSONVILLE Chapter Scholarship Program** scholar receives an academic scholarship awarded annually for demonstrated academic and leadership achievement as well as significant community involvement. The **\$500** scholarship will be applied directly to the recipient's continued pursuit of academic excellence.

1. <u>SELECTION CRITERIA</u>

- Parent, grandparent, or legal guardian of applicant, must be a current or Associate Member of the DAUAA JACKSONVILLE Chapter in good standing.
- Must be a high school senior enrolled in an accredited university, college, community college, or trade school for the fall semester of the year of application.

2. SUBMISSION CRITERIA

- All applications must be postmarked by 30 June 2017. Note: Late entries will not be considered.
- Applicant must provide two character references in the form of a letter of recommendation
 (Recommendations must be from teachers, counselors or other persons of influence in your life, other than
 relatives, who have known you at least two years and are in a position to address your character, citizenship,
 and leadership).
- Applicant must show a proven record of academic achievement.
- A certified transcript or photocopy of your high school grades (to include class rank if applicable).
- A copy of ACT or SAT scores.
- Applicant must show a proven record of extracurricular involvement, and/or community service, and leadership ability as evidenced by:
 - Listing of activities that the applicant has been involved in during high school to include school, private, and volunteer organizations.
 - Listing leadership positions held, honors, and academic awards.
- Applicant must prepare and submit an essay of no less than one page, no more than 2 pages on the topic of "Why is a college education important to me."
- The sponsoring member must be a member (includes Associate Member) of the DAUAAJACKSONVILLE Florida Chapter by June 30th, of the year of application to be considered.
- NOTES:
 - Scholarships are for one year.
 - Scholarships will be sent as direct payment to the university, college, or trade school and applied to the student' account.

Paddling for fun and for the Navy-Marine Corps Relief Society

On March 10th, one week after Corporal Esteban Blyar reached his End of Active Service (EAS) in the Marine Corps, he set out to circumnavigate the entire coastline of Florida. It is called the Florida Circumnavigational Saltwater Paddling Trail. "CT" for short and Esteban will be paddling it on his 17 foot Sea Kayak. Weather and future employment permitting, he expects to finish the 1515 mile trail in less than three months. It is understandable how the weather can affect the trip, however, Esteban additionally just finished applying, testing and interviewing to be a Law Enforcement Officer for the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC). And Esteban emphasized, "His dream job and about the only reason he would cut his kayak adventure short."

Prior to starting a new career, conquer a challenge, and raise money for the Navy-Marine Corps Relief Society (NMCRS), NAS Jacksonville, Esteban plans to paddle an average of 25 miles each day, from the Florida-Alabama Border, down the Gulf Coast, around Key West then heading north past his hometown of Jacksonville to the Florida-Georgia Border. Esteban feels it is appropriate to include the Navy-Marine Corps Relief Society (NMCRS) as part of his trip for a few reasons. He stated that he received Emergency travel assistance from NMCRS, while on an exercise in Yuma

Ariz. Esteban said that, "They made sure I made it home in time for my Grandmother's Memorial Service." DoD Breaking News

Navy reduces LCS mission package requirement by 20 units

"The Navy has made the long-awaited decision to reduce its Littoral Combat Ship mission package requirement by 20 units because of a determination made in 2014 that the service would purchase fewer ships, according to two reports viewed by Inside the Navy. The service will purchase 32 LCSs, down from the planned 52-ship buy, which in turn reduces the mission package requirement from 64 to 44. The quantity breakdown is 24 mine countermeasures mission packages, 10 surface warfare mission packages and 10 antisubmarine warfare mission packages, according to a report submitted March 1 by Pentagon acquisition chief Ellen Lord to Congress. The report was mandated by the Fiscal Year 2017 National Defense Authorization Act."

Is the F-35 Really Worth the \$1,500,000,000,000 Price Tag?

"One could argue there is a certain logic to this. The United States spends greater sums on the military than any other country (though some spend a greater percentage of GDP), and it has emphasized air power as its chief military instrument in recent decades. Additionally, different variants of the F-35 are prepared to equip the Air Force, Navy and Marines through most of the twenty-first century, and the type is also slated to serve in the air forces or navies of Australia, Belgium, Denmark, Israel, Italy ,Japan, the Netherlands, Norway, South Korea and Turkey—with more countries likely to join the list."

Army education has easier credentialing access, no multiple choice exams in its future

"The Army is changing its education system to make it easier for soldiers to obtain college credit and occupational credentials. Moving toward a more accredited curriculum is meant to help soldiers once they get out of the service, as well as aid them in following the career path they want in the military. Chief Sgt. Maj. David Turnbull, command sergeant major for the U.S. Army Arms Center, said the service is looking at ways to open up more credentials to soldiers and consolidate some of the 11,000 credentials the Army awards. Any special knowledge or skills a solider has trained to do is considered a credential."

Pentagon Tech Chief Sets Sights on Ambitious Developments

"The Pentagon's chief technologist says he wants to develop space-based lasers for missile defense within the next decade, an ambitious goal under a new pair of modernization tracks at the Defense Department. Mike Griffin, the Under Secretary for Research and Engineering, told the House Armed Services Committee April 17 he wants to make sure the Defense Department strikes the "appropriate balance between funding innovative, disruptive basic research likely to see long-term returns on investment and addressing near-term operational needs and military requirements," according to his written testimony. DoD now has two sets of modernization efforts underway, with one focused on missions and the other centered around technology, Griffin continued. The mission-focused modernization efforts are fully networked command, control and communications; space offense and defense; missile defense -- evolved midcourse and airborne [boost-phase intercept]; cybersecurity -- offense and defense; and nuclear modernization, according to his statement."


